From Artistic Director John Hubert

Welcome to the Arvada Chorale's holiday concert!

We're so glad you could join us for a truly special program of music, featuring two remarkable works: *Dreamweaver* by Ola Gjeilo and *Gloria* by Antonio Vivaldi.

Tonight's program pairs pieces that both explore themes of spirituality, but in vastly different musical languages—one modern, atmospheric and contemplative, the other Baroque, vibrant and full of life. Together, they create an evening of contrast and beauty, inviting you to experience the many ways music can touch the heart and soul.

Our concert begins with Dreamweaver, a breathtaking piece by Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo. Written in 2007, Dreamweaver transports us into a lush, atmospheric world where sound seems to float and shimmer, creating a sense of calm and wonder. Gjeilo's use of harmonies and textures evokes a dreamlike landscape, inviting us to reflect and lose ourselves in its beauty. It's a work that's both intimate and expansive, with moments of delicate tenderness and profound stillness.

After the ethereal magic of Dreamweaver, we'll shift gears to the exuberant and joyful Gloria by Antonio Vivaldi. This Baroque masterpiece is filled with radiant energy and uplifting melodies. From the soaring choral passages to the lively instrumental interludes, Vivaldi's Gloria is a celebration of both the human spirit and divine grace. The piece takes us on a journey from jubilant praise to more reflective moments, and culminates in a triumphant fugue that leaves us with a sense of joy and resolution.

Thank you again for being here with us. We hope you enjoy this musical journey as much as we've enjoyed preparing it for you. Sit back, relax, and let the music take you on a voyage. Enjoy the concert!

Dreamweaver Program Notes and Lyrics

The text for Dreamweaver is based on parts of the Norwegian medieval folk poem Draumkvedet, an epic ballad that has a lot in common with Dante's Divine Comedy. The protagonist, Olav Åsteson, falls asleep on Christmas Eve and sleeps for 13 days. He wakes up and rides to church to describe his dreams to the congregation about his brave, beautiful, terrifying and ultimately redeeming journey through the afterlife. For this composition, the Draumkvedet poem has been adapted into a playful interpretation in English by Charles Anthony Silvestri.

Gloria Program Notes and Lyrics

Vivaldi's Gloria is probably one of his earlier works for the church, and it really shows off the Baroque style with its 12 distinct sections—much more than the three or so that were common in Renaissance masses.

Each movement stands out from the one before it, with changes in things like tempo, meter, key or the way the music is arranged. The opening "Gloria" is bright and lively, with the choir singing together most of the time, using simple, repetitive melodies and a straightforward way of setting the text.

Then "Et in terra pax" switches things up completely. It slows down, moves into triple meter, shifts into a minor key, and introduces more complex counterpoint, with a chromatic line rising slowly through all the voices. This movement is the longest and most chromatic, with lots of tension that resolves into a sense of peace—Vivaldi is clearly portraying the struggle to find peace on Earth here.

"Laudamus te" is a playful duet for two sopranos, who take turns mimicking each other and singing in parallel thirds. Then we're back to the chorus for the quick "Gratias agimus tibi," which ends on a dominant chord in E minor—something that's pretty typical for a Baroque piece as it leads into a faster movement in the same key. And sure enough, "Propter magnam gloriam" picks up the pace with fast, melismatic lines and a few surprising chromatic twists that make it fun to sing.

Next up is a lovely soprano aria, "Domine deus," in a soothing 12/8 meter and a calm C major key. The soprano's voice is supported by a delicate oboe line that gives the whole thing a sweet, pastoral feel.

The chorus comes back for "Domine fili unigenite," this time in F major, with lively dotted rhythms and lots of imitation and sequence in the melody. We get more fun with "Domine deus, agnus dei," which focuses on the alto soloist, with the choir adding chords behind her and a beautiful cello line that's especially noticeable at the start and end of the movement.

The "Qui tollis" is a brief choral section, where the choir sings three short phrases that each end on a pause. After that, there's a surprise as the meter switches to triple time, picking up the pace and building intensity with more hemiola (shifting between two and three beats), which resolves with a surprising but satisfying Picardy third at the end.

Next, the alto soloist takes the spotlight again with "Qui sedes ad dexteram," a fast and substantial movement. The choir returns for the short "Quoniam tu solus sanctus," which is essentially a shortened version of the opening "Gloria," leading into the final, joyful fugue on "Cum sancto spiritu"—a perfect, upbeat ending to this lively and cheerful piece.

Gloria in excelsis Deo (Glory to God in the highest).

Et in terra pax (And on earth peace) hominibus bonae voluntatis (to men of good will).

Laudamus te, benedicimus te (We praise thee, we bless thee), adoramus te, glorificamus te (we adore thee, we glorify thee).

Gratias agimus tibi (We give thanks to thee).

Propter magnam gloriam tuam (for thy great glory).

Domine Deus, Rex caelestis (O Lord God, heavenly King), Deus Pater omnipotens (God the Father almighty).

Domine Fili unigenite (O Lord, the only-begotten Son), Jesu Christe (Jesus Christ).

Domine Deus, Agnus Dei (O Lord God, Lamb of God), Filius Pa-

tris, Rex caelestis (Son of the Father, heavenly King), Domine Fili unigenite (only-begotten Son), qui tollis peccata mundi (who

takest away the sins of the world), miserere nobis (have mercy upon us).

Qui tollis peccata mundi (Who takest away the sins of the world), suscipe deprecationem nostram (receive our prayer).

Qui sedes ad dexteram Patris (Who sittest at the right hand of

the Father), miserere nobis (have mercy upon us).

Quoniam tu solus Sanctus (For thou only art holy), tu solus Dominus (thou only art Lord), tu solus Altissimus (thou only art most high), Jesu Christe (Jesus Christ).

Cum Sancto Spiritu (With the Holy Spirit) in gloria Dei Patris (in the glory of God the Father).

Amen.

FEATURED PERFORMERS

John Hubert, Arvada Chorale Artistic Director

John Hubert is a conductor, singer, instrumentalist, musical collaborator, teacher, husband, father and lover of life from



St. Louis, Missouri. He received his bachelor's in music from Truman State University ('00) and master's in music from the University of Colorado Boulder ('03) before pursuing his career as a professional musician. John believes in the power of musical communities to bring people together and explore themselves through their musical repertoire.He has conducted inspiring performanc-

es with ensembles at the First Universalist Church of Denver, Regis University, the Spirituals Project and now the Arvada Chorale. He has been a guest conductor for many other ensembles in the Denver metro area and beyond. John lives in Lakewood with his beloved wife, Christmas, and children, Nick and Naomi.

Chappell Kingsland, Chorale Accompanist and WBO Executive Director

Chappell Kingsland's diverse professional activities share a common goal: to promote cross-cultural understanding and



create emotionally rich experiences. He is an Adjunct Professor at the University of Denver's Lamont School of Music teaching Aural Skills, Theory at the Keyboard, and Arranging. As a solo pianist and organist, his concerts and recordings weave together art music and popular music into a uniquely personal synthesis. He has released two solo piano recordings, Rock Piano Solos and Christmas Hyg-

ge, while his newest piano concert, Sgt. Pepper and the Magical Mystery Tour, includes intricate arrangements and spontaneous improvisations on songs by the Beatles. As a composer,

Kingsland thrives at the intersection of musical worlds, drawing equal inspiration from the European/American tradition and from diverse musical sources ranging from Balinese gamelan and Japanese koto to Bulgarian dance and West African kora. His operas Intoxication: America's Love Affair with Oil and The Firebringers have been performed as mainstage and outreach productions in Colorado and Indiana. Kingsland's degrees are from the Eastman School of Music (BM) and Indiana University (MM, DM). He and his wife Jennifer lead Strings of Brigid, a Celtic folk band which is preparing to release an album and present a concert in March 2025. Kingsland has been the Accompanist/Arranger for the Arvada Chorale since 2013 and Executive Director/Arranger for the Wild Beautiful Orchestra since its founding. ck4piano.com | stringsofbrigid.com

Taylor Gonzales, Wild Beautiful Orchestra Musical Director

Taylor Gonzales is an active orchestral and choral conductor based in Denver. He began conducting the Wild Beautiful Orchestra in 2021 and was named Music Director the following



year. He also serves as the Music
Director of the Foothills Community
Choir and the Associate Director of
Music/Conductor of the Chancel
Choir at Trinity United Methodist
Church. Taylor has served as the
Associate Conductor for the Denver
Philharmonic Orchestra and as a cover conductor for the Littleton Symphony and Stratus Chamber Orches-

tra. He is the co-founder and former Music Director of the Puget Sound Concerto Orchestra, and was on the conducting staff with the Orchestral Recital Series (now Tacoma Music Collaborative). He earned a music degree from the University of Puget Sound and his master's degree in orchestral conducting from the University of Denver. As a pianist, Taylor has performed with numerous orchestras including the University of Puget Sound Symphony Orchestra and the Sunriver Music Festival Orchestra.

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
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


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
